		 Back injury prevention:lifting and moving loads Loads means baggage,cargo,mail and any aircraft supplies including ballast Personnel should assess the weight and never attemp to lift or more than their personal physical capabilities Personnel must not ride up or down on the rear platform of a loader

Personal must not ride on elevating platforms when the vehicle is in drive mode When moving pallets/containers,hands and feet should be kept clear of stops/locks/guides so they do not get caught between the pallet/container and floor hardware Operatores of equipment shall ensure that other personnel are not entrapped by movement of load/pallets/containers either in the aircraft or on the loading equipment Vehicular traffic Never park or stand within 3 meters of any aircraft unless you are directly involved in the servicing of that aircraft Never park or stand within 15 meters of an aircraft being refuelled Aircraft movement(arrival/departure) Aircraft always have right of way over vehicles, equipment and pedestrians Jet engines Never approach a jet aircraft while its engines are operating An anti-collision beacon is a flashing red light located on the top and/or bottom of every aircraft.
